King Solomon Asks For Wisdom

1 Kings 3:1-28, 4:29-34, 2 Chr. 1:1-12

Samuel & Kings Series: Lesson #13

Bible Verse: Wisdom is greater than silver and gold. Proverbs 3:14

Past verses: The LORD God is very great. Psalm 104:1
I will celebrate before the LORD. 2 Samuel 6:21
Trust in the LORD with all your heart. Proverbs 3:5
A friend loves at all times. Proverbs 17:17
The LORD is my strength. Psalm 28:7
Help one another. Gal. 5:13
The LORD looks at the heart. 1 Samuel 16:7

Bible Story for children:

Focus on: Wisdom is a treasure we can find in God's word, the Bible.

Prop ideas: Gold/silver jewelry, Stacks of money, encyclopedias or almanacs

Story Tellers: If you want to tell the most famous wise ruling of Solomon (See Part C) use a Teddy bear for baby. Have scissors ready to cut.

SAMPLE STORY

Everyone should tell part A. Add parts B and/or C depending on time, attention span and maturity of class.

Part A:

King David was getting very old. Before he died, God let David know that He had chosen David's son Solomon, to be the next King of Israel. (1 Chr. 29:1) Solomon was anointed King before the people of Israel. God loved Solomon very much. One night God appeared to Solomon and said, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you." Solomon could have asked for lots of money and riches. He could have asked to live a long time. He could have asked for his enemies to die! He could have asked God for ANYTHING! Solomon asked God for wisdom. (Wisdom is being smart and knowing the right thing to do). He wanted to know how to lead and rule God's people.

God was so pleased that Solomon had asked for wisdom and not money or fame or long life. God said, "I make you wiser than any person has ever been. In fact, there will never be another person as wise as you." Because Solomon had not asked for things for himself, but had asked for wisdom instead, God gave him the wisdom but ALSO gave him what he DID NOT ask for, riches and honor. Solomon became a very wealthy king. No other king around could compare to Solomon. He was known and honored all around the world.

Part B:

Solomon was smarter than any person had ever been. People from all over the world would come to learn from Solomon. He described plant life like

the cedar trees in Lebanon and the Hyssop that grows out of walls. He taught about animals, birds, reptiles and fish. He wrote 3000 proverbs and over a thousand songs. Solomon was a very wise man.

Part C:

(For a modern twist, you could tell this part by substituting 2 children and a doll, teddy bear, model plane etc. for the women and baby. Use something valuable/ irreplaceable to children).

People of Israel would also come to Solomon to settle their differences. They knew that he was a wise and fair Judge. One time two women came before the king. The first woman told the king her story. “We live in the same house and both had baby boys born just three days apart. Her baby died during the night. She snuck into my bed, took my living baby and replaced it with her own baby. When I woke up, I saw that the baby with me was dead, but I looked closely at him and he was not my son!”

The second woman said, “That’s not true! The living baby is mine. Your son is dead.”

No one else had been around the house to tell which woman was lying. Who was telling the truth? Solomon knew how to tell. He said, “Bring me a sword. Cut the child in half and give one half to each woman.” The first woman cried out, “No! Do not hurt the baby. Let her keep him.” The second woman said, “Fine. Neither of us will have him. Cut him in two.”

King Solomon then knew that the first woman was the baby’s real mother. She was willing to give him up in order for him to live. Solomon gave the baby to her. Everyone saw that Solomon had wisdom from God to give justice.

TEACHER EXTRA: Bring fish, birds, reptiles or small mammals –show various plants

COMMANDMENT MATCHING GAME

Materials: Matching Cards

Do: Mix cards up and place face down on table.
Let children turn over two cards to try and make a match. Read the Bible thought or verse on each card.

Talk about: A wise person obeys God’s commands. We need to learn them in order to obey them. What are some of God’s commandments? (Think about past Bible verses).

TREASURE SNACK

Materials: Bananas (In 1st Floor Kitchen)
Cool-Whip or Redi-Whip (In 1st Floor Kitchen)
Paper plate
Plastic knife
Spoons
Plastic Cups (In room)

Do: *Have everyone wash hands before starting. Let the children help with the preparation of this snack as much as you feel they are able. This may be difficult with a large and/or active class. In that case, you can prepare as directed while the children are participating in another activity.*
Peel banana and place on paper plate. Cut into small circles using a plastic knife.
Place a small amount of whipped topping into bottom of cup. Place a few slices on banana on top and cover with more whipped topping.
After offering thanks for the food, let children eat with a spoon.

Talk about: You can *dig* into your whipped topping to find a *treasure*. What do the banana slices look like? (Gold coins?) God says that wisdom is more valuable than gold and silver.

TREASURE CHEST W/ GOLD & SILVER COINS (Color & Glue)

Materials: Coloring page (Treasure Chest)
Gold/silver circles
Bible verse stickers
Crayons (In room)
Glue sticks (In room)

Do: Let the children color their treasure chest. Help them glue a few gold and silver pieces in the chest. Let them add a bible verse sticker.

Talk about: Wisdom is more valuable than gold and silver. We can learn God's wisdom by listening to God's Word, the Bible. You can also pray to God and ask for wisdom just like Solomon.
